Archivist's Report

As members of Al-Anon it is our responsibility to encourage and support Alateens as they journey to recover from the effects of alcoholism and find their voice. Lest we forget, alcoholism remains a deadly *Family Disease*.

History of Alateen (continued)

(This is the second installment of the summary of the events in the life of that part of Al-Anon which is devoted to its younger members, the Alateens. From its beginning, in 1957, Alateen has been richly blessed with public interest; no opportunity for turning the spotlight on this important part of the fellowship was allowed to slip by. This, and the enthusiasm and dedication of the teenage members, accounts for its fabulous growth in numbers and in service.)

These notes are extracts from meetings of the Board of Directors and various committees, and reports in the World Service Conference.

1962. Results of a survey reported to the Board reveal that new members are acquired through schoolmates and school guidance counselors. Some groups use newspaper announcements. Alateens, and sometimes their sponsors, contact alcoholic clinics, juvenile and family courts; a great deal being done to reach those teenagers who need help. Alateens respond excellently to every opportunity to explain program.

Board members commented on a problem which (as of 1973!) is not yet solved: the difficulty in finding Al-Anons sufficiently interested and grateful to be willing to act as sponsors. ("The strongest, most progressive groups have dedicated, responsible sponsors.")

Alateens show strong desire to be self-supporting, show maturity and a desire to assume responsibility. Sponsors report that young people are amazingly good at absorbing the program and finding ways to pass it on.

Two new groups formed in correctional institutions, started by teenagers whose problems were related to alcoholism in the home.

Board announced that these findings would be made into a special report and sent to all Alateen groups. It will also be covered in The FORUM, and as a digest in the Delegates Brochure as a topic for discussion at the World Service Conference.

A report on Alateen group activities was made by Manda R., chairman of the Alateen Committee.

In the first three months of 1962 there were 60 proposed groups.

Suggestion was made to query Alateen groups as to whether they would want to send Group Representatives to their Area Assemblies. Also whether they should be represented at Intergroup meetings. As to the first, it was voted to leave the decision up to the Alateen groups; on the second question, the decision was to be made by the local Intergroups. It was noted that all Intergroups routinely include Alateen in their listings.

A questionnaire sent earlier to 160 Alateen groups brought responses from 54, along with ten letters with detailed information about meeting programs, sponsorship, attitudes, activities. Most sponsors very proud of the teens for their grasp and use of the program, "an inspiration to all," to quote one letter. Groups had from two to 25; the largest in Nemphis with 62 members. A number of original members remain until they move on into an Al-Anon group. Reasons for dropouts: marriage, working, going into military service.

Many of their parents disapproved of their going to Alateen; others were inspired, by the visible changes in attitude of their teenagers, into joining an Al-Anon group.

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Nore than 100 letters resulted from an Alateen article in SEVENTEEN Magazine, (Shadow on My Life) written by the daughter of an alcoholic.

The Board was again reminded of the importance of getting Al-Anon members to act as Alateen sponsors,

Wanda attended the Alateen meeting at the New Jersey AA Convention in South Orange. A speaker from the Newark Alateen group gave a brilliant talk and did a great job of answering questions.

of 16 proposed groups, seven registered; again, the great handicap was lack of willing sponsors.

An article in the New York Herald-Tribune (Parents Drink; Child Suffers) explained that Dr. Margaret Bailey, of the National Council on Alcoholism, is starting a 3-year study in this field.

Realizing the seriousness of the problem of the alcoholic home in which teenagers grow up, the Committee voted to plan a more comprehensive booklet-the next major effort (and expenditure:)

As of September 1962, 199 Alateen groups were functioning; 70 more proposed. Wanda reported a steady and growing flow of inquiries.

An Alateen Norkshop was held at the New Jersey Altogether at Stirling. All teenagers from N.J. and metropolitan New York groups were invited.

An article in the October LADIES HOME JOURNAL brought some 250 inquiries,

Wanda, chairman of Alateen Committee, arranged for a showing on WCBS TV to coincide with the publication of this article; also a showing on WJRZ for which she arranged to have the station manager attend an Alateen meeting. The Alateen author of the SEVEN-TEEN article referred to earlier was invited to speak at a Symposium of the American Psychotherapy and Psychodrama Ass'n.

A mention of Alateen in an Ann Landers column brought heavy response, as did a number of references in Mary Haworth's column.

203 Alateen groups registered; 54 more proposed. Registrations now averaging one-a-day!

1963. The Alateen program is becoming more international in scope. New groups have sprung up in India, Puerto Rico, Trinidad and England. In Australia and New Zealand, which have had a number of groups for some time, there has been a substantial increase during the year. Likewise the United States and Canada. Groups now registered are 262, a 25% increase over the preceding year. There has also been increasing interest among the clergy, teachers and professionals in the field of alcoholism.

Mentions of Alateen in Ann Landers column, concentrated efforts by the Delegates to the World Service Conference, frequent mention in the FCRUM end in local newspapers, all helped to make the dedicated work of the Alateens themselves bear fruit.

Two new booklets were published during the year: A Guide for Alateen Sponsors and For Teenagers with an Alcoholic Parent. They were enthusiastically received by the members of Alateen.

The AA Grapevine agreed to publish an updated revision of their article It's a Teenaged Affair in the near future.

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At the World Service Conference in April, a number of Delegates asked to be allowed to sit in on the meeting of the Alateen Committee, indicating the growing interest in this part of our fellowship,

In the course of the year, there were many helpful suggestions particularly concerning the problem of sponsorship, so important to the vitality and success of Alateen.

Alateen groups participated in Conventions and Conferences, and other get-togethers, either as part of an AA and/or Al-Anon event, or on their own. They were represented in Oregon, Minnesota, New Jersey, Alabama, Texas and California.

The Eastern Seaboard Alateen Conference was held at Tufts University in Boston, Mass. Plans are already underway for next year's Conference to be held in the Rochester-Syracuse area. These events are planned, financed and attended entirely by Alateens and their sponsors.

Alateens of St. Paul, Minnesota have been asked to serve as court helpers at Juvenile Court, a tremendous recognition of the importance of Alateen.

In summarizing her report to the Board and the World Service Conference, Wanda said: "Because of the necessary fluctuations in teenage groups, we must make it an obligation to keep in close communication with them to preserve their continuity and purpose. Obviously the Alateen members of the fellowship cannot continue indefinitely with Alateen. As they grow out of Alateen and into Al-inon groups, we look to them to continue the good work they have begun, particularly as well-equipped sponsors of upcoming Alateen groups.

Those of us who have had the privilege of working closely with Alateen know how much our program can do to alter the direction of their young lives for the better. I am sure none of us would want to leave undone anything that will help them to well-adjusted adulthood."

Manda then suggested that a member familiar with Alateen-the program and its problemsbe added to the staff.

1964. During this year, Alateen continued to grow internationally as well as in the U.S. and Canada.

Numerous mentions of Alateen in newspaper columns, particularly those of Ann Landers, continued to increase the volume of correspondence with people wanting to know about Alateen.

In April, a new member was welcomed to the staff: Timmy U., who was given the responsibility for all Alateen work, including correspondence with members and groups, as well as concerned professionals. Timmy was also to be responsible for the Alateen newsletter, which started publication in July. A contest was held to select a name. The majority of Alateen groups voted for ALATEEN TALK.

Later in the year, Ritz C., a long-time member, was appointed Chairman of the Alateen Committee.

The 1964 World Service Conference initiated Delegate representation on the Alateen Committee. The first Delegates to serve were from the following Areas: Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Ohio, Texas and Ontario, Canada.

Participation in regional Conferences and Conventions, both A. and Al-Anon, continued strong, as did the Alateen Conferences. The annual Eastern Scaboard Conference was held at Syracuse University. Before it closed, plans were made to hold the 1965 Conference in Haverford, Pa. At midyear, the Los Angeles area held a Round Robin which

was attended by over 100 teens and their families. Later a similar event took place at Burbank, Calif. These were but a few of the get-togethers held or shared by Alateens in various parts of the country.

A growing number of groups were being established in institutions. They were enthusiastically received by the authorities, who acknowledged the excellent work being done by Alateens.

Several new pieces of literature were added to the ..lateen material. ... is promised, the A. Grapevine published a revised version of It's a Toenaged Affair and this was reprinted as a leaflet. An article in YOUTH Magazine, Alcohol, Alibis and Alateen, was also reprinted and included in our Literature list.

1965. The report of the Alateen Committee to the World Service Conference started out with this key statement: "Lateen is becoming more and more an active

part in the .1-inon Family Group picture."

The Alateen groups contributed generously to the work of the World Service Office, clearly reflecting their gratitude for the work done by the fellowship's central office for them.

The Eastern Scaboard Alateon Conference, held at Haverford, Pa., was attended by members and sponsors from twenty groups in Massachusetts, Delaware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Connecticut and Virginia. The Burnside Group of East Hartford, Conn. was to host the next year's Conference.

The first Southeastern Alateen Roundup was held in Huntsville, Ala. Eight states were represented. At a closed business meeting it was voted unanimously to continue the Roundup, with the Bessemer group of Birmingham being host next year.

Numerous other Alateen groups took part in AA and Al-Anon regional events all over the continent as well as overscas.

"lateens played an active part in the International A. Convention in Toronto with two highly successful Workshops. Had their own Hospitality Room.

.LATEEN TALK continued to keep the registered groups informed of aleteen activities around the world.

Correspondence with the groups was at an all-time high; in instances involving serious problems, an appeal was made to the World Service Delegate, with most satisfying result

Many letters were sent to troubled teenagers and many were referred to groups.

Sponsor trouble still loomed large. A "Questionnaire for Sponsors", approved by the World Service Conference, was sent with each proposed-group letter in order to determin the background and qualifications of the sponsors.

Literature Coordinator's Report

By the time you read this, it will be the week of the Vernal Equinox, March 21, one of the two times a year the Earth's axis is tilted neither toward nor away from the Sun. Day and night are roughly equal in length and the Sun is directly overhead on the Equator. It's the official beginning of Spring. It's close to St. Patrick's Day on March 17 and also close to Easter which falls on April 1st this year (no fooling), but which can fall as early as March 22nd or as late as April 25th. As I write this there are snow storms all over the Northeast and Midwest, but in my yard in Atlanta, the forsythia has already bloomed, the bloodroot, bridal veil, and snowflakes are in full flower and the hostas, Solomon's seal and may apples are poking their heads out of the ground. I'm ready to switch to my shorts and crocs for the next 7 or so months, although the cold snap this week has temporarily dissuaded me. I hope it's as lovely in your neck of the woods. We can compare notes at AWSC in April and Assembly in May.

What's my point? There is none, other than for me to wish you Happy Whatever. However. March 21 is also roughly the midway point between January and May AFG Area 11 Assemblies, so let the countdown begin till we meet again or for the first time in Macon.

At the May Assembly you are required to come visit me in the Literature Room. Attendance will be taken. I will have several large intimidating individuals (Thumper, Bam Bam, and Scary Man are currently signed up) roaming the halls to encourage and assist you into the Literature Room. Take it from me, they don't take "No" for an answer. Their motto is, "The beatings will continue until morale improves." So you might as well come of your own



volition and bring visitors, spouses, teenagers, lost AA folks, and random hotel guests. You will buy a lot of Conference Approved Literature if you know what's good for you. This might be one of those few times when Al-Anon (or at least me) favors promotion over attraction.

Can you believe that a lot of other Areas don't even sell literature at their Assemblies? They just do some literature displays/highlights. Count your lucky stars that the Area 11 Literature Room's dog and pony show stands ready to sell, sell, sell nearly every piece of Al-Anon literature available, as well as to provide upbeat, three ring circus surroundings. You never know whether you're going to hear Dolly Parton or The Clash or whether the light displays are going to rearrange the circuits in your brain.

At our January Assembly, the Literature Room sold approximately \$2000 of CAL. That's in addition to the pre-ordered literature that was picked up at Assembly. Our Assembly sales have recently been accounting for over 40% of Georgia Area Central Services (GACS) literature sales. Thank you. Looking ahead to our May Assembly, GACS, our Literature Distribution Center (LDC) for Assembly, asks that DRs and GRs remind their groups to submit literature pre-orders for payment and pick-up at Assembly by the Friday before the week of Assembly. Doing so increases the likelihood that orders can be filled in time as well as more completely. It helps me insure that I have enough literature on hand so as to not run out at Assembly. It also cuts down on lines, time in lines, and frowny faces.

The new phone book's here, the new phone book's here. No, wait, that's Steve Martin in The Jerk. I'll try again. The new Service Manual's here, the new Service Manual's here. Sounds so nice I said it twice. I'll try to have many, many, many of the new Service Manuals (P-24/27) on hand at Assembly for all your shopping needs. You may be asking yourself, well how many of these does my group need anyway? Well, let me tell you. There's the one for the GR. And, what about one for the Alternate GR? And since these folks ought to keep their copies near and dear, your group needs to have a group copy on the premises at all times (not in the trunk of your car). Your group might also want to have a copy available for sale. And since we keep it by giving it away, Sponsors might want to encourage Sponsees to step up in service and that they might want to have a Service Manual by their side in doing so. Let's see, how many copies am we up to? That's 4 or 5 and counting for each group. At \$5 each, we're only up to about \$25. See how easy math is and how cheap the Service Manuals are? There's nothing like the



hard copy version; the electronic version is for sissies (just kidding). However, the printed version, strikes a chord within me, akin to hearing the reassuring plop of the newspaper hit-ting my driveway.

Pamphlet P-24, Groups at Work, is the first 79 or so pages of the Service Manual. These should also be available in the Literature Room. It's a fabulous resource for only \$1. My group gives one to each member.

Speaking of the Service Manual, the WSO website has the new one in searchable format with new features for navigating. It's also available in a PDF format which you can search by using Control F. The new manual eliminates the alphabetical index at the back, but has a greatly expanded table of contents at the beginning, although finding relevant pages may take some getting used to.

Did you know that in addition to English, Spanish and French editions of CAL, that WSO publishes literature in 38 other languages. Most of the languages have at least one book and several pamphlets available. Check out the Literature Section of the WSO website for more information, especially if for some strange reason you need some literature in Finnish or Serbian or any of the other 36 languages.

The roll-out of new Al-Anon literature proceeds apace. "Understanding and Hope for Parents and Grandparents (Pamphlet P-94) is scheduled to be introduced at the 2018 World Service Conference in April. Our new book, tentatively titled, "Intimacy in Alcoholic Relationships" is on schedule for introduction at the 2018 Al-Anon International Convention in Baltimore in July.

The new daily reader has received well over a thousand sharings, but WSO still needs many more as this will be the first reader to include sharings on each of the Steps, Traditions, and Concepts of Service. It takes a lot of sharings to create a robust reader. All submissions will also be considered for inclusion in upcoming Forums. Information on submitting your sharings of experience, strength, and hope can be found on the WSO website.

You may have noticed that the covers of our pamphlets look different. That's because as supplies of older versions were exhausted, new "fresh" cover designs were added for the newly printed ones. However, very few pamphlets have any revised text. So if your group has "older" pamphlets, even those with text changes, it is up to the group's discretion to sell, use internally or for outreach, or even throw away and replace with "pretty ones". The old ones remain CAL. Text revisions have occurred, most notably in P-36 (Al-Anon Fact File, revised 2000), P-32 (This is Al-Anon, revised 1998), P-21 (Youth and the Alcoholic Parent, revised 2013), and P-41 (Facts About Alateen, revised 2005).

As I mentioned at the January Assembly, our Newcomer Kits (both the new bound ones and the older separate-pamphlet ones) do not contain the Steps and Traditions. This resulted when the pamphlet P-13, Purposes and Suggestions, was removed from the Newcomer Kits because the pamphlet was repetitive of other information included and also to keep the cost lower. It does not appear that WSO will change the Newcomer Kits in the near future. However, groups are free to supplement the Newcomer Kits by adding P-13, Purposes and Suggestions, or other CAL or to add the Steps and Traditions to a Meeting List which is inserted in the Kits. The most economical way to do this is to insert the Al-Anon Program



Wallet Card, M-7, in the Kits. These are only 10 cents each.

Now for a string of random one and two sentence blurbs: PAY ATTENTION If you go to the WSO website, under the Members Tab, and click on WSO and then News from WSO, you will taken to the "In the Loop Page" (News From Your WSO). There you will find a reprint of the September 1976 Reader's Digest article entitled, "An Oasis Called Al-Anon" It's a great piece of historical Al-Anon information. You can also sign up to receive future "In the Loop" issuances by email.

Still nearly new is the "Paths To Recovery Workbook" (P-93) for only \$10. It's a great companion to working through the "Paths To Recovery" book (B-24, \$19). Buy the two together for \$25, saving \$4.

Remember, all the Al-Anon Guidelines, covering a wide range of topics, are available for free download on the WSO Website.

WSO has informed the fellowship that the hardcover book, "How Al-Anon Works" (B-22, \$15) will be discontinued after current supplies are exhausted. This decision will be revisited in three years. The soft cover "How Al-Anon Works" (B-32, \$6) will become the only version available.

Those great old outreach roadmap bookmarks have been discontinued in favor of a newer bookmark, but several versions of the roadmap bookmark can be downloaded on the WSO website. They make a great eye-catching, economical outreach tool to which you can add your local meeting information. If you have a collection of old Forum Magazines gathering dust, come and see me in the Literature Room at Assembly. We'll try to see how we can make them available to other Al-Anon members in the form of an archive/ historical resource.

My three year term as Literature Coordinator will end after the September Assembly. If you have any questions or even a glimmer of interest in exploring the wacky (and fun) world of the Literature Coordinator for the next term, come and visit me in the Literature Room or send me an email at <u>phi-</u> <u>land123@comcast.net</u>. It might be that some big bad Sponsor or an inner voice is telling you to step up in service. You probably ought to listen.

Remember, at Assembly, you are required to walk up to at least 5 total strangers and introduce yourself. That's somewhere in the Service Manual, but since they got rid of the index, I'm having a little trouble finding it.



Since my report is now approaching "War and Peace" length, I'll cut you a break and end it. See you soon.
