Literature Coordinator's Report

So the weather's about to go sub-freezing on most of us, but I'm burning up to tell you about Al-Anon Literature "stuff". Cold - Check, Rainy - Check, Dark - Check, Dreary - Check. But the sun is always shining in the Literature Room at Assembly so bring your lotion, towel, flip flops, Speedo (wear the Speedo please) and shades with you in January to Assembly in Macon. There might even be some beach music.

Now that the serious stuff is out of the way, I can turn to the fun stuff. **WARNING: SUBLIMINAL MESSAGE TO FOLLOW.**

YOU WILL BUY CONFERENCE APPROVED AL-ANON LITERATURE AT ASSEMBLY. YOU DID NOT JUST READ THIS, BUT YOU WILL REMEMBER IT AND WILL BUY LITERATURE AT ASSEMBLY. Don't make me come looking for you.

At our September Assembly (you remember, the Alateen Spaghetti one), the Literature Room sold approximately \$2500 in literature. This is in addition to all the literature that was pre-ordered, delivered, and paid for at Assembly. Thank you, thank you.

When you come to the Literature Room, you'll have an opportunity to meet Angie, our new Public Outreach Coordinator. I'm sure you'll get her hard sell and soft sell on the wonderful world of Public Outreach as she steps in the shoes of Debi S., our outgoing Public Outreach Coordinator. Let's start the new year off right with a Public Outreach project for your group and district.

Looking ahead, Georgia Area Central Services (GACS), our Literature Distribution Center (LDC) for Assembly, asks that DRs and GRs remind their groups to timely submit literature pre-orders to be paid for and picked up during Assembly weekend. Please submit orders by the Friday **before** the week of Assembly. Doing so increases the likelihood that your order can be filled in time as well as more completely. It helps me insure that I have enough literature on hand so as not to run out at Assembly. It also cuts down on lines, time in lines, and frowny faces.

There will be plenty of the new 2018-2021 Service Manual (P24-27), available for only \$5. Pamphlet P-24, Groups at Work, is the first 79 or so pages of the full Service Manual. It's a fabulous resource for only \$1. My group has chosen to give one to each member.

"Understanding and Hope for Parents and Grandparents" (Pamphlet P-94) was released at World Service Conference last April. It is available for \$.75.

Our newest book, Intimacy in Alcoholic Relationships, B-33, was released at the Al-Anon International Convention in Baltimore in July. It is a 144 page book on all forms of intimacy in relationships, available for \$11. Sales have been so successful (35,000 copies since July) that it is currently on back-order at WSO, but we hope to have adequate supplies by Assembly.

The 50th Anniversary One Day at A Time (ODAT) daily reader, B-6-50 was also released at the International Convention. It is available for \$15, but supplies are limited. It was a one-time printing, so when the current supply is exhausted your opportunity to have one will be gone. Hint: Buy one while you can.

It is not too late to order the second printing of 2019 Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism directly from WSO for your public outreach projects. These are to be shipped in April 2019. There are significant volume discounts available. Some districts purchase copies for their groups, others consolidate group orders to gain the volume discounts. Check with your District Representative. Or, your group could just go out on a limb and commit to do a big enough service project to get you into the world of volume discounts. More info on pricing and availability can be found on the WSO website.

The "Just for Tonight" bookmark, which was given conceptual approval by the 2018 WSC is now ready for design and translation. No date for publication has been set. THE FORUM BOOK (working title) project has received 813 suggestions for favorite articles to include. Members are still encouraged to submit suggestions from 2016, 2017, and 2018 Forums. See the WSO website for more info.

The WSO has received over 1400 sharings for the NEW DAILY READER (working title) and still needs sharings specifically on the Legacies. Sharings on the Steps, Traditions, Concepts, and Warranties are still encouraged. See the WSO website for more info.

Members are encouraged to submit sharings for "CAL Corner" on how they use the pamphlets "To the Parents of Alcoholics" (P-16) and "Hope and Understanding for Parents and Grandparents" (P-94). Sharings are also being sought on "Understanding Ourselves and Alcoholism" (P-48), "Opening Our Hearts, Transforming Our Losses" (B-27) and "Intimacy in Alcoholic Relationships" (B-33). My three year term as Literature Coordinator for Panel 56 has concluded. However, I have agreed to participate in the January Assembly. That's a good thing as I get a lot of jollies out of doing this, getting back more than I give, On the other hand, it's not such a good thing because it means that no one has stepped forward as my replacement for the new panel.


